After a cocktail hour, I invited President Birkholm to lead us in an invocation. His thoughtful presentation reminded us all of our shared values and the power of the Four-Way-Test. I spent a moment reflecting on the five-year plan we put in place beginning with President Jose and how President Rick represents the culmination of that first plan.

Then President Paul Netzel talked about how LA5 has changed over the years and struggled with membership and vision, but also how proud he is of the direction the club has taken over the last ten years. He stressed how well we have adapted to the new Rotary, the new, younger, more diverse and eclectic Rotary, while still exemplifying



the best in Rotary as a model - not only to our District, but to Rotary International as well. He told us that he circumnavigated the globe as many as five times while serving as the Chairman of the Rotary Foundation Trustees. On those trips he said LA5 was always on the forefront of the international Rotarian's minds.

President Rick followed those remarks by emphasizing the importance of building a bridge from the legacy of LA5 to a future that is responsive to a changing Los Angeles. He outlined specific initiatives like 'Families are Forever'; a Community Grants Day that builds upon a legacy project and pairs it with a new tradition like Fast Five. He highlighted several current initiatives around membership and donor development that demonstrate progress and growth. Finally he welcomed President Elect Matt.

President Elect Matt delivered an eloquent and inspiring message about how his work is just a perfect fit for Rotary and how excited he is to build on that strength hoping to open up new avenues of success in international projects and specifically looking at Afghanistan as one of the few remaining countries in the world still plagued with Polio. PE Matt has big plans and a broad vision that is sure to inspire our membership and to entice new members to join us.

It was a terrific evening of fun and fellowship among a wonderfully diverse group of LA5 leaders. We shared ideas, stories and vision. It's an exciting time to be a part of LA5!

Who inspires you to be better? Why?


My children. Most kids look up to their parents no matter what. But, I would like to be a worthy example of such responsibility.

Waging Peace

When I first saw Rotary President Mark Maloney's logo and theme, Rotary Connects the World, I ascribed little meaning to it other than what is said. That is until mid-January when I attended the Rotary World Peace Conference 2020 held in nearby Ontario at the Convention Center.

This two-day conference, last held in 2016, was hosted by seven regional Rotary Districts including our own 5280, with others from Southern California, Northern California and Arizona. It attracted some 800 attendees from these areas and well beyond, literally connecting the world. There were 13 tracks, each with 10 to 14 topics, or a total of about 150 presenters as well as another 25 keynote speakers.

Topics too numerous to list here were discussed in the tracks that covered creating peace in your life, education and literacy, protecting and rehabilitating community, peace in the workplace, international and Rotarian peace efforts, human and civil rights, diplomacy and war, creating personal peace by connecting science, spirituality and religion, media's role reporting/eliminating



conflict, sustainability, understanding how to deal with trauma in peace-building and women as peacemakers. Whew!

What this conference experience showed me first and foremost is that as bad as I sometimes lament this world is, I now know that millions of people literally everywhere are helping out in all kinds of ways to make it better. I heard them speak, I visited their exhibits, I read their biographies and about their good deeds. It gives me hope to know this. And I feel inspired to continue in my own small way.

In that regard, as you may be aware, our club is reviving our Peace Committee, in conformance with Rotary International. As chair I am seeking another one or two others to serve on the Peace Committee to wage peace at LA5! One upcoming event is a Peace Conversation at our Friday, March 27 breakfast meeting. There we will sit at our tables and together offer our views on — not necessarily solve — a topic of common interest to our club, to be announced soon.

Also February 26 — March 1, Grace Farrell and I are joining about 100 others from District 5280 for the annual Humanitarian trip this year to Oaxaca, Mexico. Our projects will include installing solar panels on homes to provide electricity for the first time, converting a small jail into a bakery and community center and refurbishing a school yard and a senior center — all in 4 days! I will take lots of photos!

All of this to say that peace building is a process that needs much and continuous TLC to overcome the negative forces fighting against it. Yet the positive outcomes are as large as saving the planet! I encourage you to attend the March 27 breakfast conversation and consider the effect you can have as one person doing good things connected to the world!
